Secondly, we will look at how QA results could be made more visible, and how students can promote this, and practically usable for students or prospective students.

Could we envisage a Quality Assurance system that is distinctly built on a supranational premise? We'll have a few contributions to give food for thought on this, as it is a key question in this policy area for the future.
