What do we mean by elections?

- Students' Associations across the country run sabbatical and volunteer elections to elect their leaders and representatives.
- Election season is usually a relatively small part of the year however it is the time when the association has the most exposure.
- We should be promoting and thinking about elections throughout the whole year

Roles and responsibilities

- Education Act 1994, Section 22
- 1)The governing body of every establishment to which this Part applies shall take such steps as are reasonably practicable to secure that any students' union for students at the establishment operates in a fair and democratic manner and is accountable for its finances.



Roles and responsibilities

- (2)The governing body shall in particular take such steps as are reasonably practicable to secure that the following requirements are observed by or in relation to any students' union for students at the establishment—
- d)appointment to major union offices should be by election in a secret ballot in which all members are entitled to vote;
- (e)the governing body should satisfy themselves that the elections are fairly and properly conducted;



Election guiding principles

- Involving and Accessible
- Valid and Secure
- Nurturing Citizenship
- Raising Awareness of the Association
- Legal and Conforming

- Planning
- Implementation
- Review



1. Strategy

• Questions to consider: Who will your returning officer be? What form will voting take? When is your voting period? What resources do you have? How will you promote elections? Will you hold referenda? How will elections link in with other activities throughout the year?





2. Planning

3. Implementation
